October 2021 - September 2022

A Year in Transition Arts and education leaders navigated a maze of transitions in 2022 as the pandemic continued to reshape the education ecosystem. The Arts Education Partnership (AEP) experienced its own year of transition, moving from virtual to in-person events, onboarding new staff members and navigating priorities as we forged a path forward. Transitions create opportunities for innovation and reimagination. AEP navigated the year's changes by innovating and reimagining its work within the strategic mission: to build leadership capacity for arts and education leaders. To manifest the strategic mission, AEP worked in three areas this year: cultivating a strong network, promoting arts education, and elevating equitable and

transformative practices.

Annual Survey

AEP conducted its first Annual Survey for partners, affiliates and other arts education leaders. This survey gathered honest feedback about AEP's work and relationship with stakeholders. 128 people completed the survey during a two-month dissemination window.

AEP hosted 115 participants at the Research and Funders Policy Briefing in March. The goals of the event were to convene researchers, funders and practitioners to begin a dialogue around gaps in arts education research; motivate, connect and engage these groups to consider how to address these gaps; and discuss relationships between how new research and collaborations inform changes to policy and practice.

Our Shared Future: Imagining a New Landscape for Teaching Artists

AEP continued to coordinate a series of National Town Halls for Local Arts Education Supervisors with leadership from the Arts Education Policy Working Group. Two events held in April and August convened over 100 supervisors to discuss emergent topics and challenges in leading district arts programs, including: teacher shortages, budget challenges and funding sources, teacher recruitment and retention, alternative certification options and teaching artist certification pathways.

This year, AEP collaborated with external partners to host a variety of virtual events. Each event garnered a different audience of arts and education leaders researchers, funders, teaching artists, local arts education supervisors and others - in all stages of their careers. These events offered opportunities for new relationships and connections across arts disciplines and organizations.

Research and Funders Policy Briefing

In April, AEP supported Our Shared Future: Imagining a New Landscape for Teaching Artists event, first national convening for teaching artists. This virtual event drew 843 individual attendees from 48 states, plus some international attendees. Our Shared Future was a collaboration among AEP, Teaching Artists Guild, National Endowment for the Arts, U.S. Department of Education and Hewlett Foundation.

The Arts Education Policy Working Group transitioned to a new model with three subcommittees focused on local, state and federal policy. Each subcommittee has one or two chairs, and these chairs together share responsibility for leading the overall working group. In addition to leading the town hall series for local arts education supervisors, working group members explored timely issues including teacher shortages, funding opportunities and social and emotional learning.



Juvenile Justice Series: Broadcasting Arts Experiences

After the intro post in ArtsEd Amplified last year, AEP continued work on Juvenile Justice: Broadcasting Arts Experiences. This five-part series focused on arts learning impact stories from youth in the care of juvenile justice facilities or those directly providing services to youth.



Theatre Counts

In November, AEP released Theatre Counts, the fourth installment in the Arts Counts series. This report documents the benefits and student outcomes of theatre courses for all learners. The featured studies, pulled from ArtsEdSearch, show theatre's positive impact on student success.




The Arts and Literacies

In December, AEP published The Arts and Literacies, an interactive and adaptive web-based resource. The resource captures insights and reflections of attendees who joined last year's thinkers meeting series. Through this resource, AEP expanded the definition of literacy beyond reading and writing text to include meaning made through interactions with sound, image and movement.

In February, AEP released Components of an Arts Education and Student Wellness Ecosystem. This resource provides an overview of policies and actions at the local, state and federal levels that impact the health of this ecosystem and collaboration across agencies.



ArtScan

In March, AEP published its annual update to ArtScan, a clearinghouse of the latest state policies supporting arts education from all 50 states and the District of Columbia. This year's update included the addition of the Department of Defense Education Activity, which has 160 accredited schools spread throughout the Pacific, Europe and the Americas.




Student Health and Wellness Policy Academy

In May, Education Commission of the States convened teams from four states – Michigan, New Mexico, North Carolina and Rhode Island – for an in-person policy academy in Denver, CO focused on student health and wellness. AEP supported planning and implementation and facilitated a team from North Carolina. The AEP team continues to support the North Carolina team on technical assistance related to their action plan.

STEAM Policy Academy

This year, AEP continued work started at the July 2021 STEAM Policy Academy by providing technical assistance for teams from South Carolina, Vermont and West Virginia. Through these technical assistance opportunities, AEP presented at STEAM forums, led strategic planning sessions with state STEAM teams and spoke at the Smithsonian Action Planning Institute.

Centering Student Voices to Transform Educational Systems

In August, AEP published Centering Student Voices to Transform Educational Systems. This report serves as an update to AEP's 2013 research bulletin Preparing Students for the Next America and centers student voices in the conversation about transforming educational systems.

Building on previous work to expand and make ArtsEdSearch more useful, AEP hosted a series of ArtsEdSearch Thinkers Meetings. AEP invited educators, artists, researchers and other stakeholders to inform a more inclusive process for identifying and adding studies to ArtsEdSearch.

In the Annual Survey, 98% of respondents agreed or strongly agreed they feel confident about and trust in the research from ArtsEdSearch. 92% indicated they use ArtsEdSearch to feel knowledgeable about arts education outcomes, and 88% use ArtsEdSearch to inform their work.



Annual Convening

AEP highlighted student voice in the planning for the 2022 Annual Convening. The Convening marked a return to in-person events for AEP, gathering 179 participants in Baltimore, MD from Sept. 14-15. AEP engaged Baltimore arts and education leaders and youth as part of a revitalized local planning committee. Through this collaboration, AEP centered Baltimore youth in the Convening's opening and closing plenaries as session planners and facilitators. The youth leaders set the tone for an energizing event.

The Annual Convening featured 56 speakers, 49 of whom were presenting for the first time at an AEP event. Sessions and plenaries highlighted innovations and key issues at the forefront of arts education policy and practices. Leading topics included arts education data, systems change for arts education and student health and wellness.
